

- Updates on both of these areas (ASB and the Mayors pledge) are included in the quarterly report to the West Yorkshire Police and Crime Panel.
- At the end of March 2023 the Mayor has helped increase the number of frontline police officers and staff by 516 and is on track to deliver on her pledge by May 2024.
- The Mayor/ Deputy Mayor annually visit all Neighbourhood Policing Teams across West Yorkshire, speaking to staff, communities and members of the public.
- The Mayor and DMPC feed in to consultation which support the reduction of ASB through Public Space Protection orders.
- West Yorkshire has been chosen as one of a number of pilot areas for the immediate justice scheme. The Mayor/DMPC are in the early stages of discussing the scheme and its impact to reduce ASB with partners.

7. Mayor's Safer Communities Fund

The Mayors Safer Communities Fund continues to deliver projects to tackle crime and ASB. Grant Rounds 1-3 have awarded 173 projects a total of over £1.3m. There are currently 78 projects focussing on Neighbourhood Crime and ASB totalling £486,367.63.

PARTNERSHIP CONTRIBUTION

Both statutory and non-statutory partners work at a local level to support Neighbourhood Policing, this may also include PCSO partnership funding arrangements.

EQUALITY, DIVERSITY, AND INCLUSION

There are significant equality, diversity, and inclusion aspects to the Neighbourhood Policing and ASB agenda. Some communities, including those impacted by multiple deprivation, may be much more affected than others.
